What are Students' Union elections?

Students' Union elections are your chance to choose who will represent you. The students you elect will become either student officers or school representatives, and will act as your voice in the University. They have the power to drive real change in the Students' Union, University and beyond, so it's vital that you have your say on who wins.

Why your vote matters

Education is one of the biggest investments you will make in your future. Voting means you get to choose who is working on your behalf, helping you get the best experience – and best value – from your time at the University of East London.

The people you choose have the power to create change, and will have a noticeable impact on your life at uni, from academic matters to your social life and wellbeing. It's also the best way to get your voice heard by the University.

With that in mind, it's really important to spend a little time having your say on who should hold that power. This is your chance to shape the next year of your life. Don't miss out.

How does voting work?

We use the single transferable vote (STV) system. This produces more representative results than other systems. The system's name says a lot about how it works.

You have one vote, which can be transferred to lower-preference candidates if needed. This means no vote is ever wasted. If your first-choice candidate doesn't win, your second or third could instead.

All the student officers will be elected in a single election. The specific roles will be allocated after the successful candidates are confirmed.

How to vote

- **1.** Rank candidates in order of preference. Number your favourite candidate 1, second favourite 2, and so on.
- 2. You can rank as many candidates as you like, but we encourage you to rank as many as possible at least five in the student officer election.
- **3.** If you don't like any of the candidates, you can vote to re-open nominations. In the case that this is the most popular option, no-one will be elected, and a new election will take place.
- **4.** The system will take care of the rest, transferring your vote where needed. This means you will have a say even if your top choice doesn't win.





Candidate conduct

It's really important that all our candidates follow the rules during elections.

It is against the rules for someone to:

- Pressure you to vote for a candidate
- Try to make you log in to vote
- Try to make you use their device to vote

Our elections are designed to be free and fair. You are entitled to vote in private, and your choices will be kept confidential.

If you think a candidate has broken the rules, report it to us at su.elections@uel.ac.uk so that we can investigate their behaviour.

Best practice for voters

- Get informed. Take the time to read the candidates' statements and watch their videos on our website or Instagram before you log in to vote. Don't make a snap decision.
- Consider the candidates on merit and vote for those you think will be great student representatives. Don't just vote for someone because they're on your course or from the same place as you. Really consider who would do the best job for students!

Candidates for student officer

Student officers are our highest level of student leader. The students you elect will represent the entire student body, acting as your voice to University decision makers.

To introduce, I thing there should be some sort of networking activities for students to do networking with the students of different departments, so that people with business ideas or activities can connect and plan further


For change, I think that there should be little change in lectures patters like there should be question and answer time before the lecture ends which will improve student engagement in lectures.


Secondly , more career and networking opportunities for all students


If you are elected, what would you help to improve?
